Analysis Preliminary Exam Applied Mathematics, September, 2004

(1) Consider the first order ordinary differential equation

$$\dot{x} = x^3 - 3x^2 + x,\tag{1}$$

where x = x(t) is a real valued function of real variable t. Recall that a subset S of \mathbf{R} is said to be a positively invariant region for (1) if, whenever $x(0) \in S$, then $x(t) \in S$ for all $t \geq 0$. Prove that $[0,4] = \{x : 0 \leq x \leq 4\}$ is a positively invariant region for (1).

(2) Consider the second order ordinary differential equation

$$\ddot{x} + x^3 = 0. ag{2}$$

Prove that (2) has no unbounded solutions.

(3) Consider the following equation for an unknown function $f:[0,1]\to \mathbf{R}$:

$$f(x) = g(x) + \lambda \int_0^1 (x - y)^2 f(y) dy + \frac{1}{2} sin(f(x)).$$

Prove that there exists a $\lambda_0 > 0$ such that for all $\lambda \in [0, \lambda_0)$, and all $g \in C([0, 1])$, (3) has a unique continuous solution.

- (4) Let X be a normed linear space, and let X^* be its dual.
 - (a) State the Hahn-Banach Theorem for X.
- (b) Use the Hahn-Banach Theorem to prove that if the pair $x, y \in \mathbf{X}$ has the property that $\phi(x) = \phi(y)$ for all $\phi \in \mathbf{X}^*$, then x = y.

(5) Suppose that $f \in H^1([a,b])$ and f(a) = f(b) = 0. Prove the *Poincare Inequality*

$$\int_{a}^{b} |f(x)|^{2} dx \le \frac{(b-a)^{2}}{\pi^{2}} \int_{a}^{b} |f'(x)|^{2} dx. \tag{4}$$

- (6) Let $A: \mathcal{H} \to \mathcal{H}$ be a bounded linear operator on a Hilbert space \mathcal{H} .
- (a) Give the definitions of the point, continuous and residual spectrum of A.
- (b) A complex number λ is said to belong to the approximate spectrum of A if there is a sequence (x_n) of vectors in \mathcal{H} such that $||x_n|| = 1$, and $(A \lambda I)x_n \to 0$ as $n \to \infty$. Prove that the appoximate spectrum is contained within the spectrum, and contains the point and continuous spectrum.
- (c) Give an example to show that a point in the residual spectrum need not belong to the approximate spectrum.
- (7) Let $f_n: [0, +\infty) \to \mathbf{R}$ be a sequence of continuous, n = 1, 2, 3..., and suppose that there exists a constant $c \geq 0$ such that $f_n(x) \geq -c$ for all $x \geq 0$, $n \geq 1$. Prove that, for all $n \geq 1$, we have

$$\int_0^\infty e^{-f_n(x)-x} dx \ge e^{\int_0^\infty e^{-x} f_n(x) dx}.$$

(Hint: $d\mu = e^{-x}dx$ is a probability measure.)
